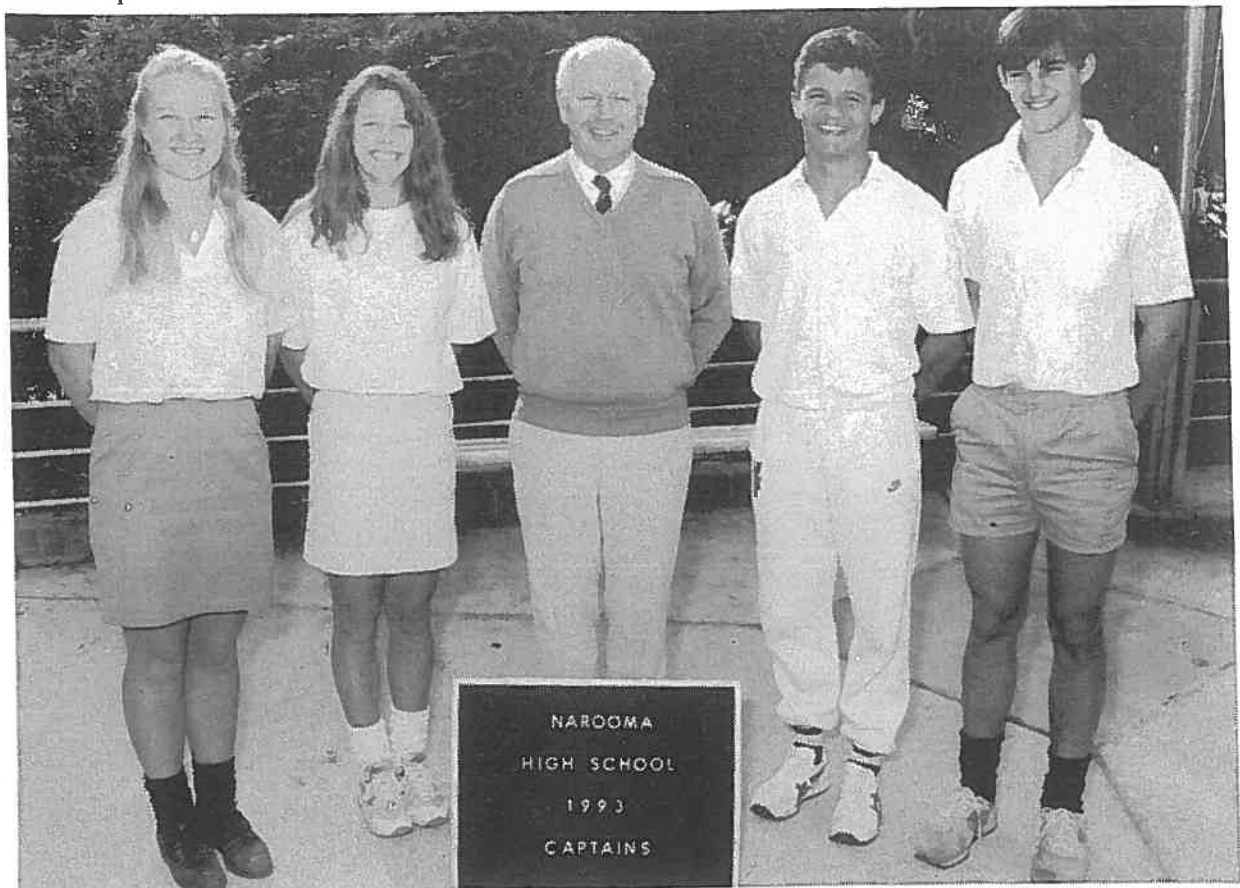
On behalf of all the captains I'd like to thank everyone for their support, and the chance for us to show our stuff. We all attended the Anzac parade, and I would

PERFORMING ARTS

1993 saw a flourishing of the Performing Arts at Narooma High School that led to a great deal of recognition for our skill and talent outside the school community. The Performing Arts year began with a show prepared for Senior Citizen's week in April. The Drama Club and music students combined to present 'Dancing with 'Roos'. This was a good opportunity for our students to have contact with the elderly of our town.

Intensive rehearsals began in earnest in April and May to prepare Narooma High's entry into the Far South Coast Interscholar Performing Arts Competition 'The Big Gig'.

Students and staff devised 'Strangers Epic', a tribute to the music of the supergroup Queen. The show included the elements

of music, dance and drama to tell the tragic story of Freddie and Beth and their thwarted love.

Narooma was judged the winner of the competition over Bega High's extracts from 'Jesus Christ, Superstar' and Batemans Bay High's 'Time Warped'. The judges praised Narooma High's entry for its polish and professionalism.

The news of this fine win quickly spread to the Education Department's Regional Office in Wollongong, and Narooma High was invited to perform the 'Bohemian Rhapsody' section of 'Strangers Epic' at the Wollongong Performing Arts Centre in the Southern Stars show.

This was a show for the display of excellence in the performing Arts from the South Coast and was presented for the Assistant

Director General, Mr. Terry Burke and invited guests including a delegation of Education experts from Canada.

Narooma High's Performing Artists were on their way. Soon after their Big Gig triumph Narooma students in June auditioned successfully to perform in the South Coast Dance Festival.

Eighteen dancers from years 7-11 choreographed a street dance to 'A Touch of Love' from the 'Sister Act' soundtrack. Again Narooma High was praised for its excellent stage etiquette.

Later in July the Drama Club was selected to perform in the South Coast Drama Inaugural Festival. Seven members from the Club performed in 'The Dying of Sam's Mate Mickey' by Allan Mc Kay. The performance was a hit for its energy and humour.

To celebrate the Year of the World's Indigenous People, the South Coast Region held a concert at Moruya Primary school, attended by many Education Department dignitaries and leading members of the South Coast Koori community. Narooma High's music students and Koori dancers performed to Yothu Yindi's 'Djapana'. Narooma High was also responsible for the technical expertise for the rest of the concert.

Interested students in Drama have had additional opportunities to extend their skills by attending camps in May and August.

Eight students from years 9 and 10 attended the South Coast Drama Camp at Fitzroy Falls and enjoyed workshops in Shakespeare, movement, mime, and circus.

Junior performers in music, dance and drama attended a Junior Performing Arts Camp at Tuross Head. The art forms combined in an intensive rehearsal schedule to produce a musical play called 'Sky' - the story of two young heroes searching for an adult to listen to them.

In August, Year 9 English toured their contemporary version of 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' to Narooma Primary school- and were enthusiastically received, giving the Primary school kids a delightful introduction to Shakespeare.

September saw Narooma High School on the road again to perform a music and drama show of extracts from musical activities. The Drama Club provided the comic relief at Moruya Primary School.

Rehearsals are currently underway for three important end of year events, the largest being the Eurobodalla Performing Arts Festival which Narooma High School is hosting. At the Festival Narooma High School will revive, due to popular demand, its successful and spectacular Big Gig

'Strangers Epic', and the Juniors will be presenting their own extravaganza 'Sky'.

The Drama Studio will be officially opened in November to celebrate the equipping of a new rehearsal and performance space for Drama and Dance. This venue will seat approximately 70 people and will be approximate for small scale performances and plays.

Finally, Drama Night will be held early in December, for all English, and Drama classes and Drama club to showcase the years effort in Drama, including skits, plays and masks.

It has been a wonderful year for the Performing Arts at Narooma High school and the school fully deserves its reputation, as a leading light in the music, dance and drama.

money. This year we have spent several thousand dollars of our money for students activities. A summarised list of our activities for 1993 included,

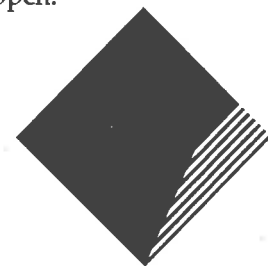

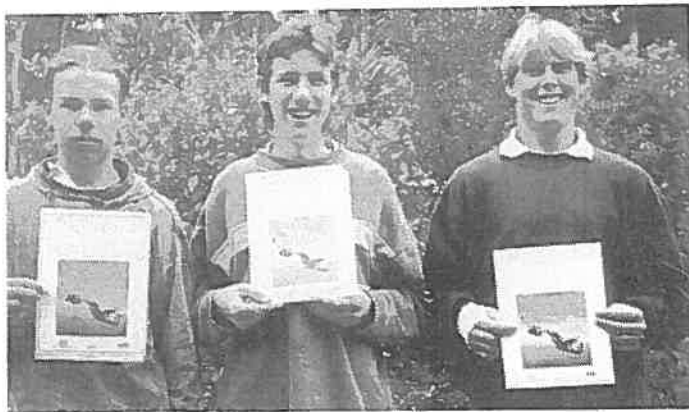

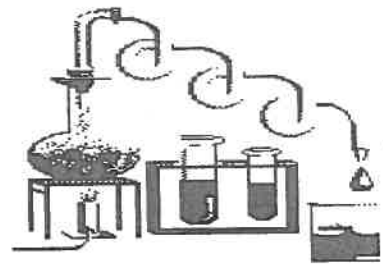

SCIENCE

The Science faculty in 1993 was without Mr. Peter Murdoch, our agriculture teacher who was teaching on exchange in British Columbia, Canada (as well as skiing and touring).

Mrs Linda Archibald, from Williams Lake in British Columbia, came as a replacement, and her friendliness and teaching abilities have helped her students to learn and enjoy their subject. Her thoughts about teaching agriculture in Australia will probably be found elsewhere in this magazine.

Since last year's magazine Year 10 gained excellent School Certificate results with 15 grade A's, the best yet, and all results above the state average.

In the Higher School Certificate there were many commendable results, particularly Kath Massey (Science for Life), Nicole Baxter (Biology and Chemistry) and Michael Foster and Michael Manning (Physics).

As usual our students did well in the Australian Schools Science Competition with top performances from Beth Cookson (Yr 7), Peter Michelson (Yr 8), Zoe Freeman and Vanessa Mckellar (Yr 9), Alan Foster, Lucas Gunn, Willow Hankinson and Danny Hart (Yr 10), and Shaun Towers (Yr 11), who all gained Distinctions (top 10% of the state).

All those who competed should be congratulated on their attempts.

Another great achievement for 1993 was Shaun Towers' acceptance as a participant in the two week CRA Summer Science School at the Australian National University in January 1994. With only a relatively small number of students accepted from across Australia, this is a great honour, which has occurred now to three Narooma High Students in six years.

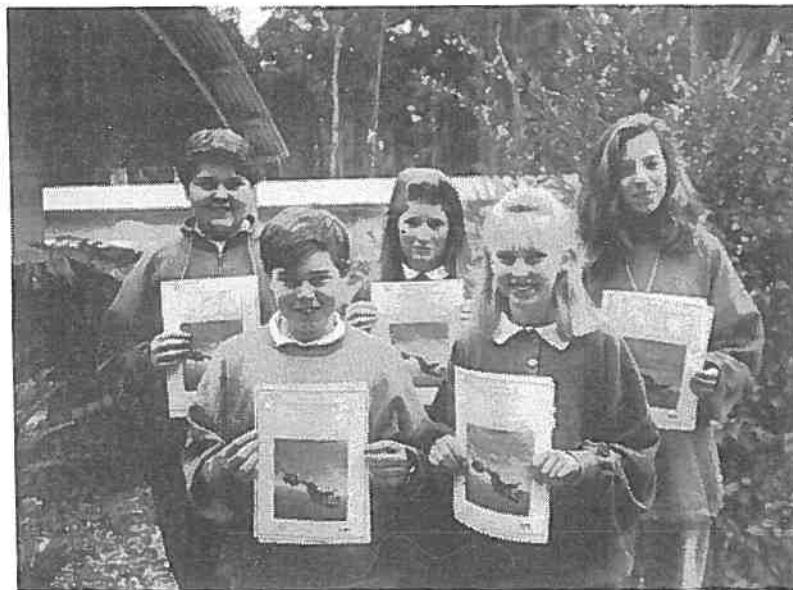
The Year 9 Summer School attracted only one student's interest and Kathleen Towers will experience science at Wollongong University after Emma Vickery and Rebecca Willcock presented positive reports from their visit to Melbourne University last summer. These science schools are sponsored by Narooma Rotary Club and we thank them for this support.

The Science Department has received a video microscope which is proving very helpful in showing students what to look for through their microscope.

We also constructed the outdoor bath for Mr. Foster (but he complains about the weed and tadpoles).

In other student activities Senior Biology students had their H.S.C excursion walking through a swamp, while Miss James' Year 8 class presented sound demonstrations to Narooma Primary School students during Hearing Awareness Week with the help of the Quota Club.

MOCK TRIAL

During 1993, Year 10 commerce students entered a state wide competition where they had to present a legal "case" before an appointed magistrate.

We first travelled to Ulladulla to prosecute a "dangerous speeding" case against Year 11 Ulladulla High students. Our first team consisted of Danny Hart as first barrister, Tammie Banfield as second barrister, Emma Vickery as our solicitor, Hannah Goodchild and Tarthra Kirby as our witnesses, and Rebecca Wilcock as our court officer.

Our barristers and solicitor had to prove, beyond reasonable doubt, the defendant to be guilty. Our witnesses had to present evidence about the case and then face up to the cross-examination. Our court officer had to swear witnesses in and generally keep the court in order.

Although we proved the defendant guilty, we lost the competition part. Our score of 115 was not good enough to beat Ulladulla's score of 140.

Our next case was against Moruya High. We had to defend a breach of contract, where a person



misrepresented the value of a business he had sold.

Although the case was a difficult one to defend, our barristers Hannah Goodchild and Rebecca Baxter did a wonderful job, Rebecca scoring a maximum score for her clarity of expression in her closing address to the magistrate. Both barristers were commended on their overall presentation and arguments.

Our solicitor, Renee Benjamin, also did a great job in preparing for this case. Lindy Underwood and Roy Massey, the two witnesses, performed well also, but suffered under cross-examination. Danny, our clerk of the court, performed very well also. Though we were defeated, it was only by the nearest of margins this time. Moruya won 138 to 135.

The third Mock Trial was against Batemans Bay High. Barristers Tammie Banfield and Hannah Goodchild were defending our client Emma Vickery who was charged with assault. Our witness Danny Hart gave good evidence.

Our clerk of the court did very well, but unfortunately we just missed out on winning, again by a very short margin.

In our final trial the case was a criminal matter involving a charge of "being allowed to be carried in a motor vehicle knowing that it had been stolen".

Barristers, Tammie Banfield and Rebecca Baxter, and solicitor Danny Hart, were able to successfully argue that our client did not know the car was stolen.

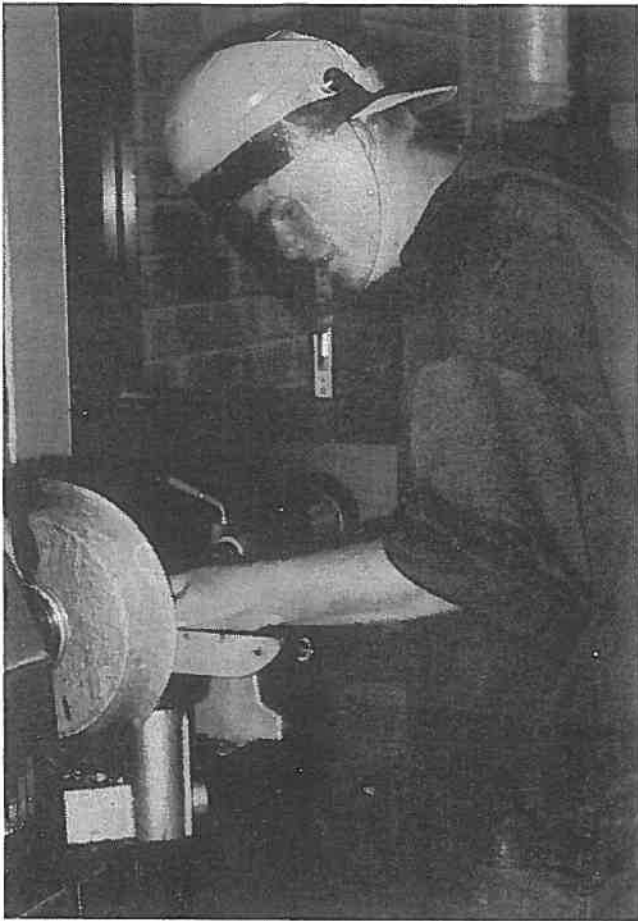

Our clerk of the court also did a good job working for the magistrate. The team's all round performance ensured them a win against Eden High School in the competition.

Year 10 commerce students have learnt a great deal from the mock trials, including how the court system works, improving skills and confidence in public speaking, and working as a team to accomplish something. We also had a lot of fun.

A big thankyou to Mr Cook who organised the whole thing, drove us everywhere, put up with Roy's eating habits and the rest of us. Many thanks also to local solicitor Caroline Dick, our coach, for giving up her valuable time on many occasions, and to the parents who helped with transport.

GEOGRAPHY EXCURSIONS

Year 9 Geography

Year 9 Geography once again visited the "Sherringham" dairy farm at Tilba run by the Hoyer family. For students who live in the urban area of Narooma or Bermagui, it was a wonderful experience to see how our rural neighbours live.

Their lifestyle is so different. The long hours, starting at 5am, would be too hard for most. Mr Hoyer talked about the various tasks involved in running a dairy farm, including the milling, feeding, breeding and so on.

Year 10 Geography

Year 10 Geography classes went into the forest! The visit, on 10th September, was planned for an area that was being logged in the Bodalla forest. Unfortunately heavy rain made the roads too

slippery, so the class had to settle for second best which was an area that had very recently been logged. Still, it was a beautiful day, and the impact of logging was able to be studied.

Year 11 Environmental Studies

This class has welcomed several visiting speakers during the year, whose knowledge and expertise has been highly valued.

Mark Everett, the Dune care co-ordination for the Eurobodalla Shire spoke to us about his job and the devastation caused by bitou bush. Mark said that the worst case of dune erosion in the shire was at at Tilba Beach, and adjoining Tilba Lake. The worst areas for bitou bush were around South Head, Moruya, and Congo. The students were very interested

in involving themselves in the activities of the local Dunecare group.

While looking at the South East forest resources, we had visits by both Steve Dodds from the Forestry Commission and Mark Johnson from the National Parks and Wildlife Service. Despite the hype from the media about the forest issue, most students found that both Mark and Steve had a lot of common ground in their talks. Everyone was very appreciative of the time and effort put in by both men.

Year 8 Geography

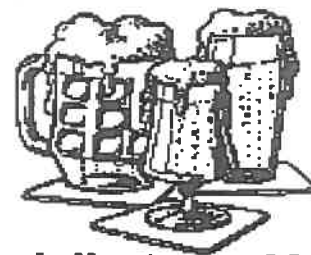
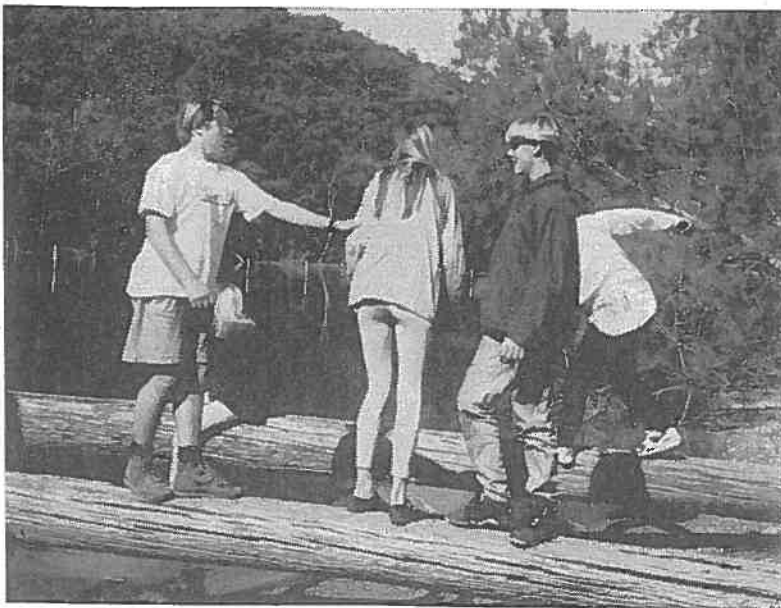
All Year 8 went "bush" on the beautiful Tuross River, upstream from Bodalla. Students were looking at the action of running water, and the land form features that result.

EXCHANGE TEACHER

An exchange to Narooma to teach Agriculture? It sounded great. But what about all the things you need to know to teach the course in a different climate? What do you plant? When? Are the farm pests different? Sheep?! And what about the kids?

Yes, it all was a worry to start with but now as my exchange year is ending I realise that things all fell into place. My gardening skills at home came in handy. Even though the frost-free growing season in British Columbia is only three months long, many of the same gardening techniques can be used here. A Narooma winter without frost is a gardener's delight.

I came from beef cattle country. Green grass is only available for feed for six months of the year and ranchers madly make hay and silage for winter months. Shaggy coated cattle fight the cold and deep snow. Sheds are not used as cattle overheat in them then go outside and freeze. What a contrast to this part of Australia where animals seem so relaxed.



A "chook"? It didn't take long to find out what that was. Sheep were new to me. There are very few in Canada. Luckily they were so small that learning to handle them was not too tough. Maintaining their health and productivity isn't that much different than cattle.

The Year 7 Science class was more along my teaching line from home. We have had fun this year learning some of the experimental techniques and scientific knowledge. How to work and act as high school students was also a big thing to learn.

Canadian and Australian schools are the same in lots of ways - reading, writing and arithmetic are still very important. Computers and the use of reference materials are becoming valuable for students at all levels.

In many ways our schools are quite different. The Ag Plot here is excellent and anything similar is not to be found in many Canadian schools. Students and teachers in Australia are very fortunate to have this opportunity for "hands on" learning.

Canadian students don't wear school uniforms. After lots of thought I now think that uniforms are a good idea as they stop the expensive "fashion parade" that seems to develop in many non-uniform schools. Wednesday afternoon sport is a treat as nothing like it exists in Canada. I have noticed that some students in Narooma do not appreciate the fun of sport. Too bad they don't realise how special it is.

I have not felt homesick all year. People have been friendly and helpful. There have been a few things I've missed though: the nine week summer holiday, cross-country skiing on the golf course



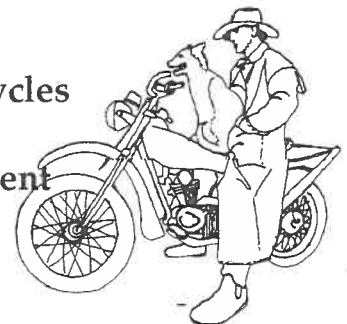

The new experiences here have more than made up for things I've missed. I've aged a bit more than normal learning to drive on the "other" side of the road. The new vocabulary has been fun - cossies, utes, chooks and loos.

I'd like to thank the Staff at Narooma High for their help this year, especially Ms Jones, my sponsor, and the Science Staff who guided me through many of the mysteries of the system. Students, the patience and help which most of you gave me was much appreciated. I hope you enjoyed meeting a teacher from Canada as much as I've enjoyed working with all of you.

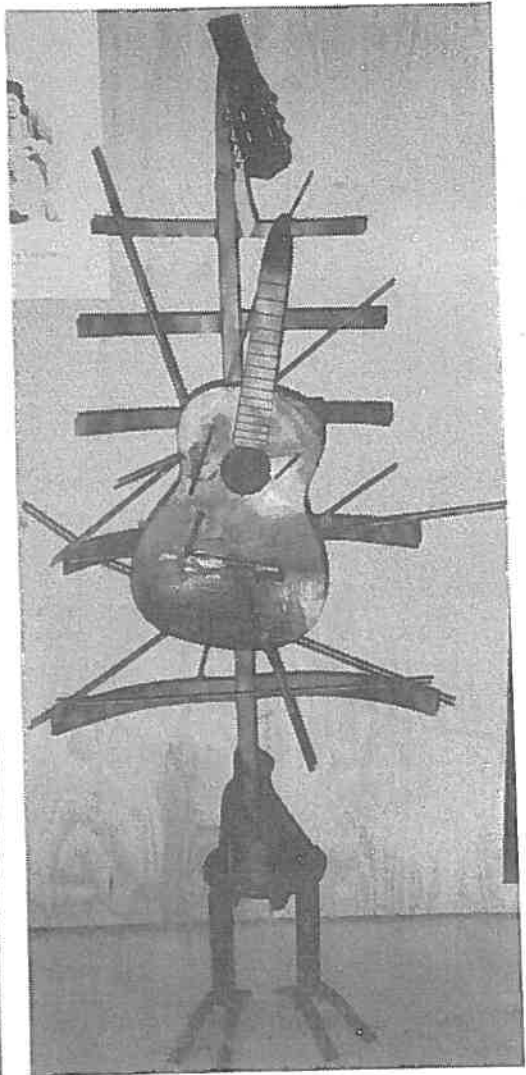

LIBRARY

Greeting from Mrs Talbot who is relieving Mrs Mood while on maternity leave with her lovely new daughter Georgia. Before Mrs Mood went on leave this year she organised the latest step in the move towards 'state of the art' information sources in this tremendously well resourced school library.

Having come from well-endowed public schools in Sydney I can assure students and parents that the facilities of this school library are well and truly up-to-date.

For instance this year we have been becoming familiar with interactive CD Rom sources of information. Could we have that in English please? By this term we mean students can "look up" information by using a Macintosh computer (attached to a printer) complete with a Compact Disc reader.

This enables the library to have a whole set of encyclopaedia, including pictures, animated sequences and film clips, incorporated into one normal compact disc. 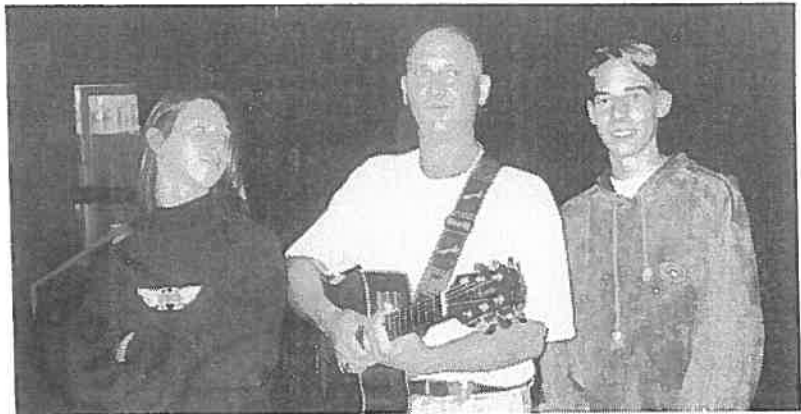

Impressions on Maths

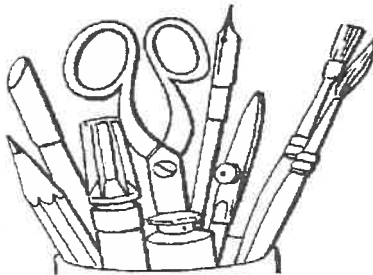

The French flag flew proudly alongside the Australian flag on that day and left no doubt that French at Narooma High School had arrived.

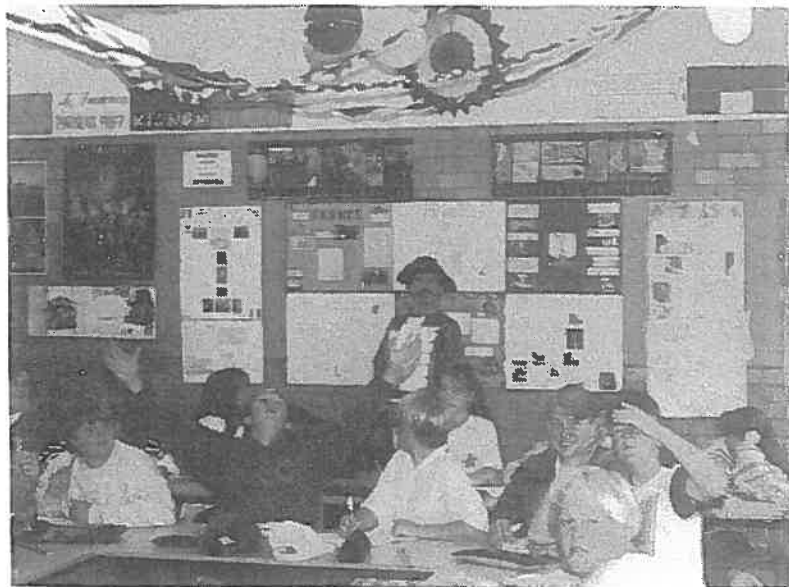

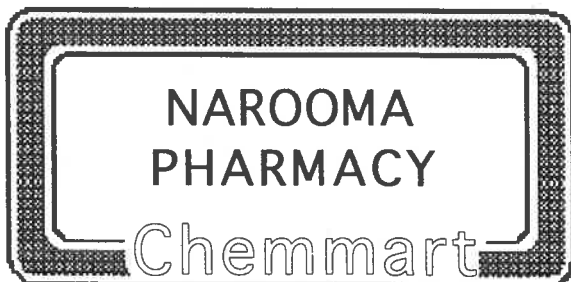

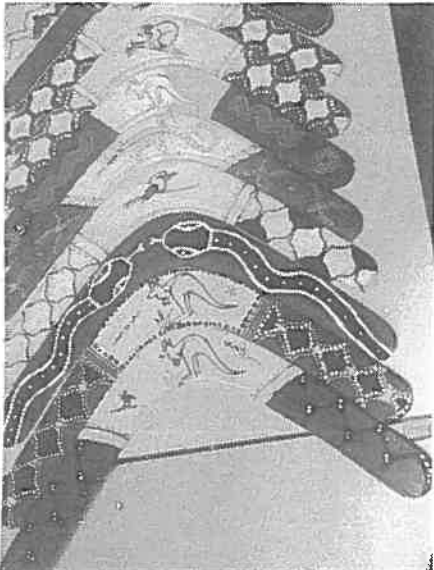

AGRICULTURE

The Ag Plot at Narooma High is still flourishing! Yes, despite the influx of 125 eager Year 8 students and Mrs Archibald, an exchange teacher from Canada, the plants and animals have survived. Thanks to the able assistance of Jason Dart and knowledge of many of the Year 9-12 students, some good crops have been produced.

1993 has been a busy year for all of the 195 agriculture students. All but the Year 12's have been involved with pasture improvement, development of two paddocks of oats for winter feed and the maintenance of the orchard. The sheep and goats required their regular care of drenching and vaccinating as well as seasonal activities such as shearing, mating, lambing and marketing.

Years 9 and 11 tended some small market garden plots of potatoes and produced a fine crop. Each student shared a garden plot. The hurt and disgust of finding crops eaten down by goats and sheep was hopefully lessened by the thrill of finally harvesting peas, beans, carrots, lettuce, broccoli, radishes and many other tasty vegetables.

The students from each year had special areas of study. Year 8's had to learn the basics of gardening: the tools used, guidelines for planting seeds and seedlings, which crops grow best in each season, how to fertilize and how to control common pests such as slugs, snails and the green caterpillars of the white cabbage

butterfly. They learned how to make compost and mulch the gardens. Hopefully the question, "...is it a weed or a good plant?" won't have to be asked as often.

Tractor driving lessons were a highlight for Year 9 students. Starting on the flat then progressing to hills and log climbing where 4-wheel drive came in handy, students developed driving competence. Safety was stressed. Sheep production and soil study were other other major topics for the Year 9's this year.



Dairying and beef cattle were subjects of study for Year 10. An afternoon visit to Kent Farm helped illustrate some of the practical aspects of the industry such as milking, calf rearing, breeding technique, medicating and animal handling. Students were given a special surprise with the birth of a calf. They also saw a double-muscled Piedmontese bull, one of the few in Australia, which will be used as part of the breeding program at the dairy.

Pasture establishment was another area of study for year 10's. They were involved in getting rid of the predominant kikuyu in the Ag Plot to replace it with more winter-

productive pasture plants. The value of native pasture plants was also considered. And what a trip to the Royal Easter Show in Sydney! The exhibits were outstanding and the night in a hotel in King's Cross won't be forgotten. Did anyone sleep?.

For year 11 and 12 students agriculture was a more theoretical study. Year 11's made a study of climate and soils and how each of these influenced agricultural production. Plant and animal production were other important topics. Paul Brown, from Narooma Garden Centre, demonstrated different techniques used by nurseries to propagate plants. Some of his knowledge was put to work developing new Tamarillo trees from cuttings taken from the old trees in the Ag plot. The Sydney show was a highlight for some of the year 11 students who joined those from years 9,10, and 12.

Mr Foster and Mr Frazier worked with Year 12 students this year. Early in the year the class completed a practical assessable task studying the weight gain of the 1992 lambs. Mr Schodde prepared the carcasses so that the students could study them. The economics of agriculture was a large part of Year 12's study this year.

Mr Murdoch WILL be back. He hopes to see all his enthusiastic students back in class in 1994. Stories about surviving a winter in Canada are guaranteed to be show stoppers. Gardening at -30°C anyone?.

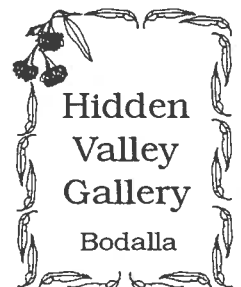

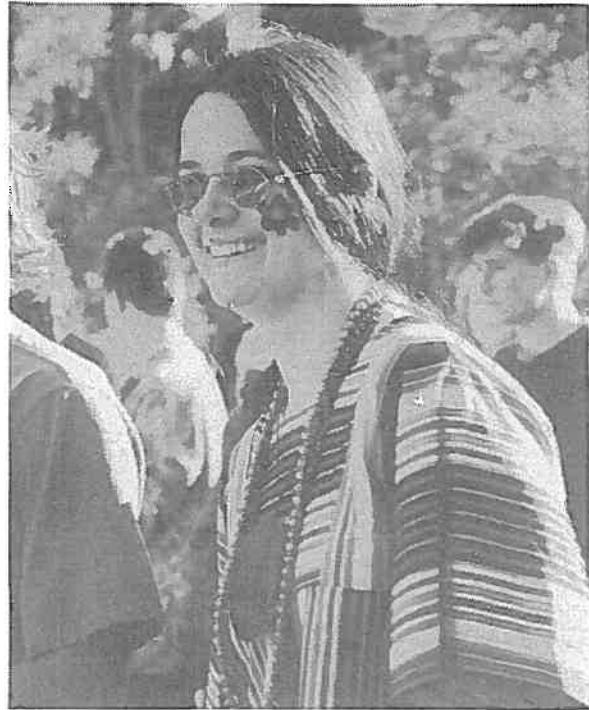
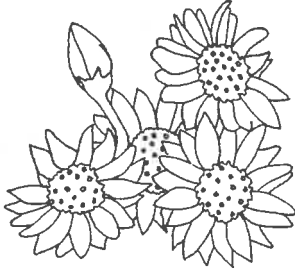

Golf

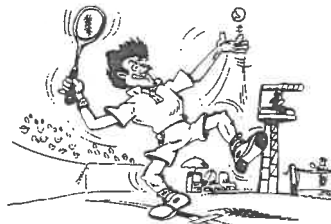

Tennis was a very even event, with both teams performing well. The senior matches were very close. After the boys and girls doubles each school had a set, and the two mixed doubles produced the same result.

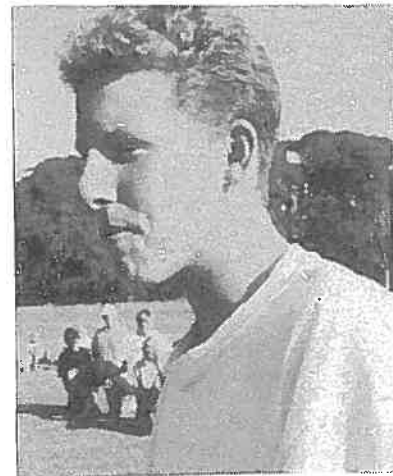

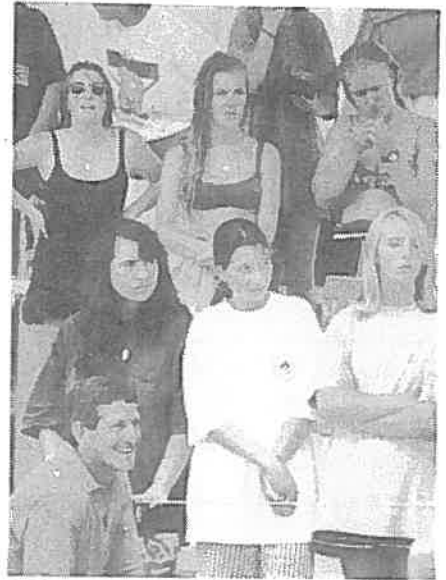

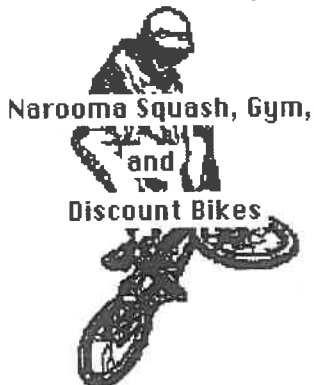

"Sarah, even though I am different from a normal person I still have feelings! If you knew what I could do you wouldn't be speaking to me like that!"

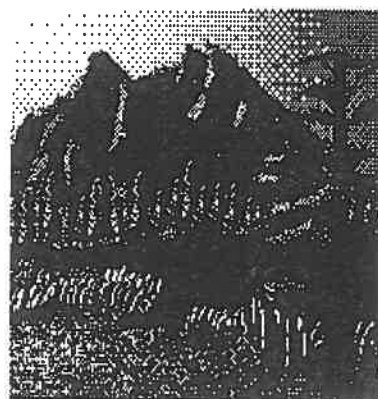
"Stop boasting! Go jump in the lake or something!" And with that, Sarah stormed off into the distance. Suddenly she found herself jumping in a lake.

They did so knowing that their chance of competing against another school in the South Coast region were not good. But it did

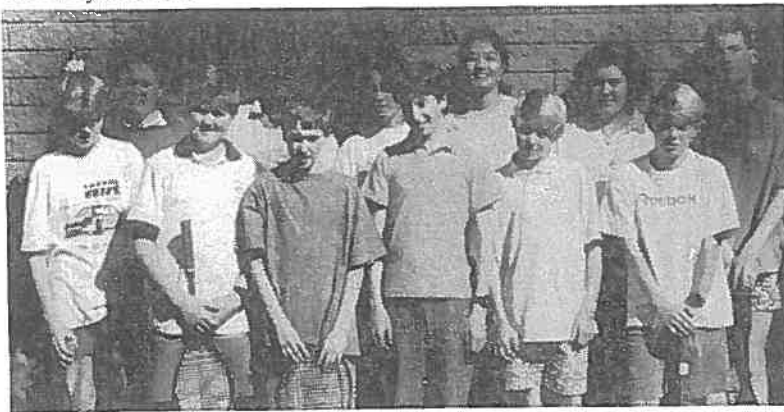

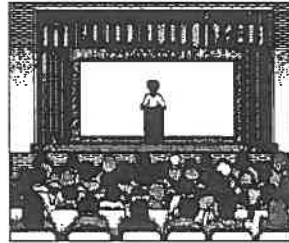

Debating

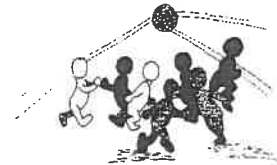

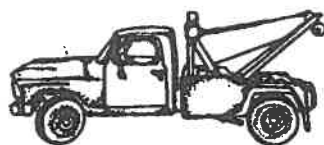


Junior Netball

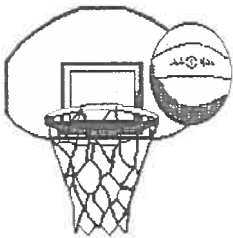
