Overall 60% of N.H.S. students gained maths results in the top 40% of the state - congratulations. These results are very pleasing to the mathematics staff. It is hoped that the 1985 students will perform as well as, or better than those of 1984.


In 1985 N.H.S. has been fortunate as there have been no changes in the mathematics staff, thus enabling students to have a smooth transition from 1984 to 1985 in their classes. Congratulations must go to Mr Melville for his success in passing his inspection in July.

New H.S.C. assessment procedures are being implemented for the present Year 11 mathematics students. The Mathematics in Society class has been working so well that they will probably complete their H.S.C. course by Term I 1986. It is good to see such an effort put in by interested students.

The Year 12-3 unit and 2 unit mathematics students found the trial H.S.C. exam extremely difficult as the papers they sat for were of an extremely high standard. Some would say that the papers were of excessive difficulty.

It has been pleasing to see the increase in the number of parents visiting their school this year to discuss their children's progress in mathematics. It is hoped that many more parents will become more involved in helping their child with mathematics, by taking the opportunity to visit their child's mathematics teacher. Such activity will help not only the students but also their parents and assist the teachers as well.

An outstanding achievement was gained by Tracey Murphy of Year 9 when she was placed in the top twenty students in the NSW University Mathematics Competition. She competed in the Junior division which was open to students up to Year 10. As a result Tracey represented Narooma High School at the presentation of Awards Ceremony held at the NSW University in Sydney.




COMPUTERS

SCIENCE.

The Science Department wishes to thank Mr Wayne Harland for the effort he has put in while replacing Mrs Philip who has been busy with her second son.

The results from the Uniscan Science test mentioned in last year's magazine were particularly encouraging with Amos Bannister and Tracey Murphy receiving prizes for being in the top 1% of the state in their year, while 5 of the 26 who competed were in the top 10% of the state. Many others did much better than they thoughtn they would.

Several excursions in Science have been conducted this year. Year 8, on two separate days, went to Bingi Point to study geology.

BINGL EXCURSION (852, 853)

On the 24th May we set off to Bingi by bus. Bingi is half-way between Tuross and Moruya on the coast. It is an isolated headland with very few houses and trees. We went to Bingi to look at the igneous rock structures and dykes.

We saw many interesting things including Aboriginal middens, the boilers of the "Monaro" a granodiorite dyke, basalt dykes, and dyke swarms.

We spent four hours during which we had a barbeque and played football.

After leaving Bingi we stopped at the 'Big Cheese' in Bodalla to have a look.

All in all it was an interesting and enjoyable day. Thanks go to the teachers who took us and John Symons for taking us there.

YEAR 11 BIOLOGY

This course of study requires students to complete an ecological study of their local area. It is a compulsory study and is examined in the HSC Piology paper each year. South Sciences

LIVING SKILLS

This year the faculty has placed far more emphasis on the Year 10 Living Skills Course. As this is the last year at school for many of the students and with the need fod survival skills in the outside world it was felt that all Year 10 should have the opportunity of an awareness course in living.

Areas covered have included Social Skills, Politicians and Australian Political History, Consumerism and Common Law as it affects the individual.

A feature of the course has been the introduction of a basic first aid and resuscitation unit where we have enlisted the assistance of the Narooma Ambulance officers. Information has been given about funnel web and snake bite, control of bleeding, bandaging as well as performing mouth to mouth resuscitation on the practice dummys. Some students have managed to gain a Life-Saving Resuscitation Award from this.

SENIOR EXCURSIONS

The Social Science department, in keeping with the practical nature of the subject, have organised a number of excursions across most course areas.

In the senior school Year 11 Geography were organised to go to Jindabyne on a week-long Geography field study excursion. Year 12 Geography have spent time studying the local region as part of their compulsory excursion studies.

Senior students also spent a day at Bega at a special school on the Higher School Certificate Economics and Geography. This day gave students an opportunity to get up to date knowledge from university lecturers.

JUNIOR EXCURSIONS

The major excursion to Sydney for Year 9 and Canberra for Year 10 have been well patronised and have provided enjoyable educational and social opportunities for the students. Other excursions to local sights included senior geography excursion to Tilba and Bega, junior geography to the rainforests of Mt Dromedary and commerce excursions to local businesses.

Year 7.4 spent half a day along the local coastline looking at various headland and beach features. This included observing rips, rockpools, wave formation and the Narooma Bar.

Excursions are a vital part of the Social Science department programmes and with your continuing support, hopefully, we will be able to maintain our excursion record.




At this time then, Industrial Arts staff would like to thank the Narooma High School Parents & Citizens Association for their kind donatioin which enabled us to purchase a "Makita" 355 Mitre Saw, thus giving the senior woodworking students the opportunity of gaining valuable experiences in the use of industrial type power tools.

We would also like to thank the School Council who kindly purchased a "Makita" two speed cordless drill which years 7 and 8 find easier to use because of its lighter weight.

In the junior school the Industrial Arts related subjects include Technics (Wood and Metal subjects), Graphical Communications and Technical Drawing. Many students this year have enjoyed making their practical projects in Technics including the copper house number, barbeque fork, centre/nail punch, garden fork, G-cramp, coffee mug stand, egg rack, deck chair, break box and step stool. These practical projects are designed in such a way that students become proficient in certain skills and have a project that is usable in the home.





Such an acquisition has been useful in the clearing of a new fence-line, thus extending our grazing area to a total of 1.8ha. In addition it has given pupils the opportunity to develop skills in machinery operation and maintenance.

During the year, 11 and 10 Ag. were involved in the establishment of an improved pasture area. There was a keen rivalry between the two groups, in the preparation and sewing of the pasture; the results were enviously compared! In general, elective classes in particular, have shown their willingness and enthusiasm for the subject, of consequence much has been accomplished.

Vegetable and fruit production has continued to show promise with many pupils proudly exhibiting the results of their toil. At present we are experimenting with a Tree Lucerne seedling enterprise as well as maintaining vegetable seedling production. Parents, pupils and local retailers have all played a role in its success.

Lastly it would be negligent not to acknowledge the contributions of Mr Streeter (farm assistant), Mrs Simpson (Lab Assistant) and Mr Butterfield to the smooth running of our agricultural endeavours - thanks.

Much has been achieved in the past twelve months, 1986 will undoubtedly see further achievements in Narooma High agriculture.


SWIMMING CARNIVAL.


1985 YEAR 8 MENTAL ARITHMETIC MASTERNIND COMPETITION




BRAIDWOOD
